Dream On


One of the widely reported phenomena of lockdown has been an increased awareness of our dream lives. Some have found their dreams more vivid, more memorable and in some cases more disturbing during this period. I don't find this surprising given the impact of Covid and the restrictions on our sense of mental well being. We are naturally anxious, and we all find our own ways to cope with those feelings. Modern psychology agrees our dreams carry messages – sometimes the meaning seems clear while at other times our visions of the night come mysteriously packaged in striking and bizarre imagery. Often the visual language of dreams combines the strange with the familiar and mundane. The Bible is full of dreams and is clear that they can be means of communication from God.

March each year invites us to celebrate the feast of Saint Joseph on 19th. In fact, Pope Francis has declared this a special year of dedication to this possibly overlooked saint. Joseph's dreams, actual and metaphorical, loom large in the Gospel. Mary's surprise pregnancy threatened his hopes and plans, but as he slept on it, things became clearer and a way forward was found through faith. His story echoes that of his namesake in the Jewish scriptures, where again we see a plan and purpose, emerging through dark twists and turns to emerge in the light of day and new beginnings.

March takes us into Holy Week enacting the fulfilment of all that was dreamt of in past times, promising faith instead of fear with hope and healing.

RUSPER CHRONICLE

We were deeply sorry to hear the sad news that Jean Shelley has passed away. We will be forever indebted to Jean for the work she did in 1980 on Rusper Churchyard.

We do have a list of gravestones which was written by Ernest Ellman in 1873. However, because of Jean's and friends work we have an updated list of the gravestones which was written in 1980.

As a group we are incredibly grateful for this information, as it gives us a huge amount of knowledge of the people buried in our churchyard. As some of you will have seen when walking through the churchyard, some of the stones have faded and lost their words and this was the same in Jean's day, although with great foresight all details which were visible on the stone were included in the 1980 list and so today we are able, with the help of the Internet, to fill in some of the missing names and dates. A map of the churchyard was also drawn in 1980 which provides us with a good location plan of each gravestone on the list.

Jean also researched the Rusper Tithe Map of 1840 tracing the original map and transcribing all the information so that we know exactly who owned what land, the acreage, the names of the fields and who was renting it in 1840. This has been an incredible resource for the Rusper Chronicle group.

She taught at Rusper School for a few months in 1972 before Miss Greenwood was appointed for Class 2 in January 1973. We have documentary evidence of this in my son James' exercise book where he has written a letter in June 1972 to Mrs Shelley telling her of his holiday plans. He also remembers she talked about castles – a fellow enthusiast. Among her papers are some of the lessons she prepared for the children on the 1851 Census – this includes a list of the popular children's names with the comment that we would find them strange now (this was back in the 1970s) but nowadays we don't find them strange at all!

Many of you will have a copy of the booklet 'Early Houses of Rusper' for which Jean did all the research, visiting and assessing the age of the houses. It was illustrated by Margaret White. Jean was already familiar with many Rusper houses through her membership of the Wealden Study Group which over many years would visit timber-framed houses in the area, study them in detail, crawl around in roofs to look for evidence of open hearths, shine strong lights into dark corners, generally cobwebby, and then send the owners a comprehensive report on their findings.

We are very grateful for her work over many years which has been invaluable for our understanding of Rusper.

Summary of Rusper Parish Council meeting & Planning Committee meeting – January 2021

The full Minutes of these and all other meetings are available to view on the Rusper Parish Council web site rusper-pc.org.uk/meetings. These Minutes are <u>draft and subject to change</u> until they have been confirmed at our next meeting.

These meetings were held virtually due to the pandemic.

Planning - 19th January 2021

Agreed responses to planning applications:

<u>DC/20/2465 Land adjacent to Pucks Croft Cottage</u>: Rusper Parish Council endorses the objections raised by local residents and strongly objects to this application for the following reasons:-

- During the production of the Rusper Neighbourhood Plan this site
 was considered as part of a call for sites exercise and rejected. The
 conclusion of that assessment was that this is a green field site and
 fails some important sustainability issues. It is on an undesignated
 country lane outside of the built up area on land currently
 designated as agricultural and used for grazing. It is more than 2.5
 miles from the nearest regular bus service along country lanes with
 no footpaths.
- This site is outside of the built up area boundary.
- The traffic survey undertaken by the applicant should be questioned as it was undertaken during the pandemic restrictions when traffic was at its lightest. Our own traffic survey undertaken previously showed that most traffic travelled higher than the speed limit.
- There are inaccuracies in the application (for example that there is a regular bus service).
- The housing need in Rupser has been met by the recent developments in Ifield and the strategic sites of Land North of Horsham and Kilnwood Vale.
- The design of the homes seems out of keeping with the rest of the village.

Rusper Parish Council has already requested that this application is decided at Committee if the Planning Officer recommends this application for approval.

<u>DC/20/2454 Land South of East Street</u>: Rusper Parish Council strongly objects to this application for the following reasons:-

During the production of the Rusper Neighbourhood Plan this site
was considered as part of a call for sites exercise and rejected.
The conclusion of that assessment was that This is a green field
site and fails virtually all sustainability issues. It is on an
undesignated country lane away from any built up area on land
currently designated as agricultural and used for grazing. It is
more than 2.5 miles from the nearest regular bus service along

- country lanes with no footpaths. There are no services to the site and provision of main drainage would be a significant issue.
- The application states that the Rusper Neighbourhood Plan should not be taken into account. Rusper PC disputes this as it has passed examination and is just waiting for Referendum which was delayed due to the Covid restrictions. Planning Officers are aware of this and already giving weight to the Rusper Neighbourhood Plan.
- The applicants already have been granted permission (DC/14/0413 and DC/14/1936) for 6 flats and 2 houses. These housing types would have been more suitable for the parish.

Rusper Parish Council has already requested that this application is decided at Committee if the Planning Officer recommends this application for approval.

<u>DC/20/2524 & 2523 Curtis Farm, Green Lane</u>: Rusper Parish Council requests that a whole site assessment is undertaken and a whole site layout is provided for the future so that the exact need for the site can be assessed and to ensure that there is no unauthorised use of existing buildings. Until this information is provided Rusper PC does not feel it can adequately assess this application.

<u>DC/20/2509 Land North of Horsham</u>: Rusper Parish Council supports the comments made by WSCC and requests the following:-

- That the bridge is segregated between cyclists and pedestrians for safety reasons.
- That additional design features are added to make it more visually attractive.
- That lighting is sensitive to the area.

<u>DC/20/2529 Thatched Barn Cottage, East Street</u>: Rusper Parish Council objects to this application for the following reasons:-

- The size of the building is too large in an area that has seen a lot of development in recent years.
- The material to be used will make the building stand out in its location

If this is recommended for approval, Rusper PC requests that a condition is added that the design is in keeping with the local area.

<u>DC/20/2581 Stud Farm, Capel Road</u>: Rusper Parish Council does not object to this application but would like it noted that it has concerns about

the way the site is developing and would request that restrictions are added to the site on any further development due to the lack of sustainability.

DC/21/0025 11 Steeres Hill: No objection.

DC/21/0005 Lakeland Land South of The Mount Farm: Withdrawn.

DC/21/0039 Land off Prestwood Lane: Strongly objects to this application for the following reasons:-

- No details have been given for the access and the impact on any trees along the route.
- All access roads to the site are single lane rural tracks which will
 not cope with the additional traffic movements, especially HGVs
 and coaches (which would be expected for a site of this nature).
 These roads are used by walkers, cyclists and horse riders as
 well as vehicles and the added traffic movements would cause a
 danger to them. There are no pavements along these roads.
- A well-used bridle path runs alongside the site, and the noise from the site would be a danger and nuisance to users of this and horses. There is no detail in the application about how this would be mitigated.
- The noise from the site would be a disturbance to the local equestrian users.
- The proposed use of this site would not be in keeping with this rural, countryside location.
- This site is in an unsustainable location.

<u>DC/21/0040 Land off Prestwood Lane</u>: Rusper Parish Council objects to this application.

Consider Ghyll Manor pre-application presentation: A presentation for a housing development was considered by Council. The presentation lacked detail but was of interest to Members so it was RESOLVED to meet with the developers to discuss the proposal in more detail.

Update on planning decisions:

DC/20/1110 Severn Cottage, Charlwood Road – Permitted DC/20/1897 Shepperton Farm, Lambs Green Road – Permitted DC/20/0380 Ifield Hall, Charlwood Road – Permitted DC/20/1933 19 Gardeners Green – Refused

The appeal for DC/20/0737 Furlong Farm was allowed.

Letter to HDC regarding acceptance of duplicate applications: It was RESOLVED to write to the MP and copy in HDC to ask them to appeal to the Secretary of State to change legislation so that duplicate planning applications cannot be resubmitted within a certain amount of time after refusal unless there has been a material change.

Council - 26th January 2021

Open Forum: Mr Richard Nordgreen represents the landowners at Stud Farm and spoke about wanting to work with the parish before proceeding with any development. The idea is to present a master plan for the site to make it more cohesive. Mr Nordgreen will attend the Planning Committee meeting to discuss this in more detail.

Precept for 2021/22: The Precept was set at £33,751.

Reports from other Authorities: Cllr. Kitchen reported that no refuse tips will close in the next year, and that dustmen have done a brilliant job throughout the pandemic. Cllr. Kitchen believes that they should be thanked for this as they have not missed a single collection.

Set date for litter collection: It was agreed to postpone this event due the pandemic and review this in six months. Residents will be encouraged to keep the areas around their own homes clean.

Representative for Public Rights of Way: Cllr. Adams was appointed.

Response to Night Flights Consultation: The consultation has been extended until end of May, except for two questions that need to be answered sooner. This decision will be delayed until the next meeting.

Plan for Annual Parish Meeting: The date of this meeting was changed to Thursday 22nd April. The meeting will be held virtually and potentially streamed online with presentations from different speakers.

Update on Recreation Ground lease and plan for the future: The landlord's solicitors are investigating the registration of land before the lease can be completed. The terms of the lease are agreed.

Q3 budget comparison: The Clerk reported that most budget lines are within budget, and due to come in within budget. As of the 30th December, there was £88,232 in the bank account. There is sufficient money to cover the remainder of the budgeted payments, with enough set aside to cover the projects and reserves. Of the expenditure still to come, around £6,900 will come from money set aside for projects and reserves, reducing the amount needed to be held to £59,781. The end of year surplus is estimated to be approx. £7,200.

Other: A planning application has been made to Surrey County Council for capping an above-ground landfill (0079). It was agreed to ask for a restriction on vehicle movements so they show the most direct route to the A24, and a clear designation of that route should not include Rusper.

easiest way to access the service is to call our Head Office number 01903 731800 and select option 3. This takes you straight to the meal delivery team who can discuss dietary requirements and menu choices. We are asking for a suggested donation of £2 per meal, but the meals are free for those on a low income or in need. All meals are freshly cooked by our chef in the kitchen at Lavinia House and frozen for safe transportation. Our fabulous volunteers are delivering the meals out across the Horsham District three or four times a week.

The second part of the Winter Warmer campaign is the **Warm Homes programme**, offering practical help and assistance to older people worried about keeping warm this Winter. The initiative helps <u>people living in, or at risk of fuel poverty</u> by offering, a) free benefit reviews b) home energy checks c) warm homes packs, including a hot water bottle, blanket and socks. 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
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
